
Lola Folkard

Sam Warren: Environmental and Sustainability Officer Chelmsford City Council

From a young age I have been fascinated by nature, wildlife, and our planet. As I grew up I learnt about climate change, our shrinking ozone layer, and the mass biodiversity loss that we are currently experiencing, I couldn't understand why more hadn't been done to stop this sooner. Since graduating from my degree studies in 2019 I have been working in an environmental team at Chelmsford City Council, developing the Love Your Chelmsford programme which aims to bring positive climate action to the city. I believe that we each have our roles to play in fighting climate change on a personal level, whilst our governments and world leaders must go about ensuring every aspect of society works collectively towards a greener future.

Prajwal Pandey: Co-Chair of the Essex Climate Action Commission

My role is to raise the voices of the young people of Essex, to help shape recommendations for Essex County Council, and to ensure that our collective action as a county goes far enough in protecting our environment and future generations. I am also an elected member of both the Young Essex Assembly and the UK Youth Parliament, where I also organise campaigning on various environmental issues, including climate change. In doing such work, I aim towards achieving a Net Zero Essex by 2050 or sooner.

Pat Gaudin: Trustee and Board Member of Essex Book Festival

I have been a trustee and board member of the Essex Book Festival for seven years, and have belonged to my book group for over 20 years. I have attended the Festival since its inception. Originally from Scotland, I came to Essex 25 years ago. Much of my career has been spent in public relations/communications and corporate strategy, most recently as an independent consultant in the local public sector across the eastern region. I have also lectured on PR diploma and university courses in particular at UAL (University of the Arts London) College of Communication. Essex Book Festival has become more and more varied and diverse and in recent years has increasingly engaged children and young people. The launch of the Young Essex Manifesto for Essex in 2020 was a wonderful catalyst for this year's Youth Summit, which is such an important event in exploring what has to be done to achieve a greener future for Essex.

Councillor Rose Moore

Rose is passionate about the protection and restoration of wild spaces, bringing nature into urban areas and increasing understanding of our interconnectivity – both as fellow humans and carbon-based life forms.

Rose is a Liberal Democrat City Councillor, elected in May 2019 to serve the residents of Chelmer Village & Beaulieu Park ward. Since 2020 she has been Cabinet Member for Greener and Safer Chelmsford.

As a Cabinet Member, Rose helps shape local policies. Her areas of responsibility include parks & green spaces, street care, waste & recycling services, and the city's two markets. She also leads on the Climate and Ecological Emergency, ensuring that it is at the heart of policymaking. This includes reviewing actions taken across all areas of the council to reduce carbon emissions and boost biodiversity. Rose works closely with the Love Your Chelmsford team, who promote sustainable living, green spaces, and volunteering opportunities in the community. Rose is keen to champion young voices. She chaired a vibrant CSES panel discussion as part of Future City in October 2020 - CSES Centenary – What will the next 100 years bring - CSES (chelmsfordses.org.uk) and keeps a copy of the Manifesto for Essex close by for inspiration.
